EAA Airventure 2025 Special Event Station

The sign-up for this year's EAA Special Event Station is now open to all ARRL members. Sign up will be drawing to a close on May 28 2025. This has to be done so the EAA can finalize their planning to accommodate us during the event.

This year we will operate on 6 days -- Monday through Saturday, during the show (July 21 thru July 27,2025). This operating event is open to all license classes. We will operate 2 HF stations, one on 20m, one on 40m, 6-meter SSB, plus local communications on 2-meters. The club call, W9ZL, will be used throughout the event.

We are looking for both "AM" and "PM" operators covering each of the 7 days. You can sign up for one shift or more if you so desire. The event is open to all of the amateur community. If operators sign up for a 4 hour shift, they will be given a daily wristband that will allow them to go and wonder around the Fly-in.

APRIL 2025 It's Time

FAQ #285 Hey, Kids, what time is it? When the first book was published on clock-making, critics said, "It's about time." (pause for laugh) You've heard that for every thing there is a season. A time to laugh, a time to cry; a time to . . . well, you know. So it's time. Spring and summer activities and conditions give us the opportunity to sharpen our traffic-handling skills. When we are working for a public service event -- a race, walk, parade -- we learn more net discipline. When it comes to practice, it's always a good time.

While we may have fun testing portable operation in warmer seasons, we are often listening through interference to get a very specific call, message, or report under less than ideal conditions. On nets, when we must relay for each other or strain to copy through the static crashes and fading, we are building our skills for message handling during times of need. Now is when following good net protocol pays off.

In spring, we prepare for severe weather. We re-check our antennas in preparation for more windy days. We review our emergency preparedness. We continue to monitor local frequencies for travelers in trouble. April may see severe weather nets. May may find us at a POTA outing, and June – of course – has Field Day, a *time* out.

In a way, summer can be kind of a *timely* and extended simulated emergency test. We use the adversity it brings to prepare ourselves to do even better what we should do well -- handle messages efficiently and exactly. And we do that because it's the primary service we offer.

So, hour you doing? (See what we did there?) Using your time to improve? Remember to send a monthly Station Activity Report to your STM before the 5th of the month. When you do, include the number of messages you originated (on behalf of someone *other than you*), the number of messages received, sent, and delivered as well as unsuccessful delivery attempts. Also file a PSHR summary. Details are on https://www.arrl.org/public-service-honor-roll. We'll add your numbers to those from our section and forward them to ARRL HQ as a measurement of how we're doing, And don't forget to count the message you send with the report. Take it from an Old *Timer*. 73 – K9LGU/STM-WI
